

CATOOSA COUNTY INFRASTRUCTURE

Business travel from Catoosa County

Twelve miles from Catoosa County is a regional airport with connections to eight major cities, including:

- Charlotte
- Chicago
- Dallas
- Memphis
- Orlando
- Washington D.C.
- Tampa (via St. Petersburg)

Within an hour and half drive is the world's largest airport hub, Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport. This airport is the primary hub of Delta, AirTran and Delta Connection with international service to South and Central America, Europe, Asia and Africa.

Major north-south Interstate-75 runs through Catoosa County, connecting the county to cities from Ontario, Canada to Miami, Florida. Interstate-24 is five miles away and Interstate-59 is within 20 miles.

Municipal Services

FIRE PROTECTION: Four full-time, seven part-time and 85 volunteer personnel provide protection for cities and the county. Fire insurance classification 5 in Ringgold, 3 in Fort Oglethorpe.

ZONING: Cities have zoning ordinances. Cities and counties have subdivision design standards.

Transportation

COMMERCIAL AIRPORT: Regional airport (12 miles) service by ASA, American Eagle, Mesaba, Pinnacle, US Airways Express

GENERAL AVIATION AIRPORT: General aviation (13 miles) with a 5,100-foot asphalt runway

LOCAL RAIL service: Piggyback (13 miles)

WATER: Navigable River: Tennessee River (9-foot channel depth)

SEAPORT: Savannah Seaport (357 miles) with maintained channel depth of 42 feet

Utilities

ELECTRICITY: A part of Georgia's modern integrated electrical transmission system, Catoosa County has excellent ability to supply industrial demands. Compared to 47% for the U.S., coal accounts for 84% of fuel used by the state's power-generating plants. This assures long-term continuity. If demand exceeds 900kw, any supplier can step in and offer service.

NATURAL GAS: Available in industrial quantities on both a firm and an interruptible basis.

WATER: Plant capacity: 7,500,000 gal/ day. Consumption: 3,033,000 gal/day average. Elevated storage capacity: 8,000,000 gal. Source: Yates Spring. Ringgold and Catoosa County water systems are interconnected for reserve to each other.
SEWER: Two oxidation ponds treated at Fort Oglethorpe facilities. There is a design on lines to Mocassin Bend Treatment Plant in Chattanooga for Peavine Valley section of Catoosa County.
